Answer: Anyone who is repenting!





What are the "Conditions of Repentance?" Question asked by a missionary in an exit interview before he left the MTC to return home because of unworthiness:

Well then, tell me, how can I break my own heart?

How do we fulfill the conditions of repentance?



Godly sorrow is not as deep as it could be, or should be, if we are only sorry because of our disobedience in breaking a commandment. Deep Godly sorrow, the kind that leads to a broken heart and contrite spirit, is the result of understanding the real consequences of our sins—the pain and suffering we have caused others, especially the price that was paid, and the pain that was suffered by Christ for us individually in Gethsemane and on the Cross.

 President Ezra Taft Benson defined a broken heart and a contrite spirit this way: "Godly sorrow . . . Is a deep realization that our actions have offended our Father and our God. It is the sharp and keen awareness that our sins caused Him [the Savior] to bleed at every pore. This very real mental and spiritual anguish is what the scriptures refer to as having a 'broken heart and a contrite spirit'"






